Rules Reminders

Rule 2

The plot must be cultivated. This means prepared and used for the growing of crops.

Rule 3

All pathways/footpaths are to be maintained to a reasonable standard and kept free of debris. This means the paths surrounding the allotment must be well defined and maintained.

Rule 23

Parking of vehicles is only allowed on the allotment site while a member is working on his/her plot. Any vehicle exceeding 30cwt is not allowed on the site at any time unless making deliveries on behalf of the Association.

Chair's Report

After a very cold winter we are now facing a dry spring and a hot summer. Meteorologists are predicting that El Nino, the weather system that can push temperatures up, has a high chance of occurring this year; making July and August even hotter. This on top of last summer where we saw the highest temperatures on record. Needless to say that hot and dry weather increases water usage. If you have not already done so please do make sure you are collecting your own rainwater on your plot; any structure you have such as a shed or a greenhouse should have guttering connected to a water butt. If you already have this, a good spring job is to make sure it is all in order, with no leaking pipes or blocked/broken guttering. I know this is on my to do list!

As we come into spring we seem to have suffered less storm damage than last year, where we saw Storm Eunice pulling up shed roofs and in one case blowing a whole shed across the allotments. Please do check your plot for any winter damage and make sure your paths are in order for the new season.

If you are still seed shopping, I note that Dobies currently have a lot of discounted seeds (some up to 70% off) and with our additional 50% discount scheme that's quite a bargain! If you search the website for vegetable seeds and view the whole list you can see which ones are on offer.

Last year I read Dave Goulson's Silent Earth, about the worrying decline in pollinating insects and what we can do about it. As allotment gardeners we can do more than most, so it is encouraging to see more people growing flowers on their allotments. Several plot-holders last year commented on how there seemed to be less pollinating insects around and saw that as a possible reason for a poor harvest in some crops. Growing more flowers, and some are more beneficial than others, is a good thing we can do to help pollinators, who in return help pollinate our fruit and vegetables.

On our website I have posted an article in the Blog, under Growing Tips, outlining which flowers are best for pollinators. Please do have a read and if you want to find out more I can also highly recommend Dave Goulson's Gardening for Bumblebees which outlines all the best flowers to grow for all pollinating insects, not just bumble bees!

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March/early April Jobs on your Plot

- Finish off the digging, tidying up your plot and preparing seed beds
- Cover the beds to warm up the soil for sowing later in the month
- Plant out onion and shallot sets & early potatoes from mid

 March
- Plant out asparagus crowns and Jerusalem artichoke tubers
- In warmed soil, sow beetroot, early peas, leeks, parsnips and carrots
- Prune apple and pear trees and gooseberries and currants
- Feed fruit trees and bushes
- Tidy the strawberry patch, adding a dressing of compost
